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Men wary of paying women compliments

MEN have become too worried about political correctness to pay women simple compliments, according to a new survey.

Their concerns are backed by 65% of women who suspect there is nothing innocent behind a flattering remark from a work colleague or new acquaintance.

While 89% of women loved to receive a compliment, 67% felt uncomfortable if it came from anybody other than their partner, the poll for Loire Valley White Wines found.

And those in Cardiff were some of the least likely to receive innocent compliments, along with women in London, Birmingham and Bristol, the survey found.

Among those in long-term relationships, 63% of women said their partners paid them fewer compliments now than they did five years ago.

Fewer than one in five women questioned (16%) received the "recommended" five compliments a day, and 12% said no one had paid them a compliment in the past three months.

Relationship expert Christine Webber said, "In my experience, women do actually care a great deal about what people think about them.

"A compliment massively boosts self-esteem. And whilst it may seem somewhat frivolous, it is in fact a vital ingredient for well-being.


"The trick though is to be able to pay someone a compliment and make them feel good about themselves, rather than coming over as smarmy or, worse, a bit lecherous."

Researchers found women preferred to be complimented on their ability to listen and give advice, and juggle career with home life. They also liked compliments regarding their outfit, haircut or style.

Elaine Morgan, writer:

- "I take any kind of compliment as a compliment. I think most women are tough enough to be complimented without quivering.
- "I don't know any women who would be insulted at receiving a compliment. I know very few women who would feel annoyed or pestered by it.
- "It depends what you compliment. If someone say nice boobs you may think 'I'm up here!' but if they say 'you're looking good tonight' or 'nice dress', what's the problem?

- "It's as if they're not used to it, which I find very disconcerting.

- "I'm sure they must like it, but at the same time they're taken aback by it.

- "If Alex, my wife, got a compliment off some guy she wouldn't feel bad about it.

- "With Alex she gets lots of compliments all the time.

- "It doesn't worry me and hopefully if I got a nice compliment slung my direction she wouldn't flip out either."
